## DRACULA STEP BY STEP GUIDE

## What you will need:

- White solid face paint (Global Colours brand)
- Stone Grey solid face paint (Global Colours brand)
- Red solid face paint (Global Colours brand)
- Strong Black solid face paint (Global Colours brand)
- Fine paint brush: Round #2 Global Colours brush
- Medium paint brush: Round #4 Global Colours brush
- Sponge
- Toothbrush
- Business card or piece of stiff card



Gel the hair back off the face. Apply white face paint to the whole face with a sponge.



Lightly dab on grey face paint with a sponge to deepen the eye sockets, under the cheekbones and the temples. Blend where the grey and white meet.



Draw a thin line of red face paint under the lower eyelashes. Rub with your finger to smudge. With a medium brush and black face paint, draw in an "evil eyebrow" as shown.



With a very thin brush and black face paint, create whisper-thin wrinkles around the eyes.With a medium brush and black face paint, outline Drakula's widow's peak on the forehead. Fill in with black and blend the paint up into the natural hairline. Under the corners of the mouth, create small vampire fangs in white, ensuring that they come from the top of the lower lip and end just under the lower lip, so they appear to be coming out of the mouth. Outline the fangs in black with a thin brush and add a small dot of red paint onto the very end of each fang.



Shade down the sides of the nose (by gently dabbing with the sponge and grey face paint) to create the illusion of Dracula's long pointed nose. Using black paint on a medium brush, draw in pointed sideburns in front of each ear.





For an added scary touch, mix up some red face paint and a few drops of water. Dip a toothbrush into this liquid, then flick the bristles of the toothbrush against a business card or small stiff paper, flicking little droplets of red paint in a splatter pattern on the chin around the fangs. Be gentle with these droplets – less is more!

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
